- 1. Call to order Joshua Scott, Chair
- 2. Comments from the public.
  - a. Terri Pearson-Bloom-send students to workshops!
  - b. Plan for next week's meeting—focus on CTE; Shawn Carney, English/math connections to CTE/Pathways, Robert, all faculty in CTE
- 3. Discussion of Institution Set Standards, part 2—Peter Cammish. During our meeting on 2/10, Peter shared regarding the setting of institution standards. We agreed on the following: 1) we need DSP at the table, 2) we should focus on disproportionate impact, 3) falling below the standard means more support, not punishment. On Friday we need to answer the following questions: what are specific standards we would like to set? What should the institution set?
  - a. Successful course completion—our avg is 66%.
  - No disproportionate impact –if a group falls below this average, we provide support, prof dev, etc.
  - c. Time to completion (degrees, certificates, transfer). This is an issue of institutional integrity. We need to set a reasonable target. Time to complete and % of success is more important than degrees awarded (many students acquiring multiple degrees).
  - d. A Path to completion. (too many units = loss of financial aide, etc.)
    - i. Guided pathways may be a solution to this.
- 4. Update: Professional Development for Spring '17.—Neil, Jose, Josh, Tracy, and all. We plan to hold student panels during optional FLEX on March 14<sup>th</sup>—After division meetings, Neil will help coordinate (along with Basic Skills Committee, of course) a Pie Party and student/faculty panel

after school meetings. This will be a chance for faculty and students to hear and understand each other. We will work with ASSC to coordinate this event.

  - i. recruit one student who has or hasn't received compassion—this can be a current or former student.

5. **High School Outreach--all**. Our goal is to collaborate with our counselors, who are hosting local high school counselors on March 16<sup>th</sup>. We will also discuss strategies to reach out to our local high schools (both the institutions and the students), to repair relationships (as needed...largely a result of the inaccurate and draconian placement policies which we have now abandoned), and to tell students that they belong here, to reach out to them instead of waiting for them to come to us. Please join us in this important discussion/planning session!

  - i. We need to have a clear message/strategy which is consistent regardless of who is presenting.
  - ii. **Create a college**-wide work group focused on college-wide outreach (see Dwayne Hunt's handout)
    - 1. Who are the students we are trying to reach in high school? What do we know about them already?

    - 3. What's stopping them from enrolling through our current channels?
