Black male achievement is losing ground with the rest of the world


The world moves toward:

Effect & Impact on Future Generations...


Of 100 African American Males in Kindergarten, how many are projected to graduate from College?




Effect & Impact on Future

- 3 are projected to graduate from College.




Percentage of California Students who Drop Out of High School

College or Prison?

- Black males age 18 and over in 2008
 represented only five percent of the total
 college student population, but 36 percent of
 the total prison population.
- Thirty-two percent of Black young adults 18-24 are enrolled in institutions of higher education, compared to 44 percent of White young adults.




Education and Earnings

- Bachelor's degree recipients in 2008 earned \$55,700, \$21,900 more than the median earnings of high school graduates.
- Individuals with some college but no degree earned 17% more than high school graduates working full-time year-round.
- Individuals with higher levels of education are more likely to have earnings and more likely to work full-time yearround.



Earnings by Race/Gender

- The college earnings premium for black males is about 42%, or \$12,500, per year.
- The earnings differential between high school graduates and associate degree recipients ranged from 17% (\$6,100) for white men to 34% (\$10,100) for black men.
