1. CALL TO ORDER

A Regular Meeting of the Solano Community College District Governing Board was called to order at 6:30 p.m., on Wednesday, April 6, 2016, in the Denis Honeychurch Board Room, Room 626, 4000 Suisun Valley Road, Fairfield, California 94534, by Board President Martin.

Superintendent-President Esposito-Noy stated this individual has been doing work at range 17, however, the District determined that a range 20 was a more appropriate classification for the individual. The current classification is not extensive enough for the work that the individual is currently doing (and has been doing). With the additional reporting requirements from the categorical and grant funded programs, it requires a much more robust research component, and currently, the individual has been doing that level of work out of necessity.

It was moved by Trustee Keith and seconded by Trustee Brown to approve the District Reclassification Lead Research Analyst to Principal Research and Data Analyst. The motion was passed unanimously.

13. BOARD STUDY SESSION (NO ACTION REQUIRED)

(a) <u>Substantive Change Report for Biotechnology</u>
Facilitated by Dr. Celia Esposito-Noy, Superintendent-President and Dr. Leslie Minor,
Vice President of Academic Affairs

Superintendent-President Esposito-Noy advised that the Substantive Change Report for the Biotechnology Baccalaureate program was submitted electronically and by US mail on March 31, 2016. She is confident it will meet the requirements of the ACJCC (we are one of 15 programs in the state that will be able to offer a baccalaureate program). Superintendent-

President Esposito-Noy acknowledged those who are involved in developing the program and curriculum: John Yu, Jim DeKloe, Ed Re, Greg Brown, Michael Wyly, and Leslie Minor.

Superintendent-President Esposito-Noy advised that this program builds on Solano's current successful industrial Biotechechnology program which the Board approved in December 2014. Superintendent-President Esposito-Noy recognized the faculty who created courses for the program as it was time consuming, encompassing many faculty and staff hours. She asked Professor Jim DeKloe to come up and share some specifics.

Mr. DeKloe advised that Solano is now a 4-year college and is making history. He was recently in Tulsa where faculty there knew of Solano's 4-year degree and would like their 2-year students to be eligible to come to Solano. In addition colleagues in San Diego, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and North Carolina also expressed interest in having their students be eligible to come to Solano. We are the pioneers and we are going to show the world that we can institute a 4-year degree. Mr. DeKloe developed upper division courses in conjunction with the Academic Senate; the key element is to show the world what upper division means. Mr. DeKloe commended Professors Ed Re and Michael Wyly in assisting with development of the program; LoVonne Slaton for preparing the business statement and incorporating comments from business partners; Michael Pelletti from Philosophy and Erin Craig from Nursing, who are setting bioethics in motion for the ultimate Nursing bachelor's degree. This report has taken thousands of hours to complete. He also commended Math and Science Dean, John Yu for putting the committees together; emphasizing that every Dean was involved in this report.

- Trustee Brown asked if we have thought about a special space on our website to highlight Biotechechnology
- Superintendent-President Esposito-Noy responded that we are working on a one-click method of getting information on website
- Mr. DeKloe stated he has a page on the website; Solano has an excellent placement rate (often 100%); he also acknowledged our partnership with Genentech
- Trustee Brown commented that students will come up to her in Safeway and state they want to get into the Biotechechnology program
- President Martin thanked Professors DeKloe, Wyly, and Re, as well as Vice Presidents
 Brown and Minor for their efforts and support of the program
