# **SUMMARY** (Continued from Page 1)

Employees will attend 240 hours of training in groups, beginning, intermediate and advanced. Each employee will receive materials and textbooks based on their class level. Any textbook costs will be billed separately to Mariani Packing Company. All successful completers will receive Certificates of Success. Additional training may be scheduled as needed with an addendum to this contract.

This phase one contract is for \$50,000.

A copy of the Agreement is available in the Office of the Superintendent-President, the Office of the Vice President of Finance and Administration, and in the Office of Workforce Development. Approval is requested at this time.

THIS AGREEMENT is hereby entered into this <u>3<sup>rd</sup> day of March</u>, <u>2016</u> by the SOLANO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT (hereinafter referred to as DISTRICT), and <u>Mariani Packing Company</u> (hereinafter referred to as EMPLOYER).

# **Terms of Agreement:**

The DISTRICT agrees to prepare and provide customized training or consultation for EMPLOYER. The training or services will cover topics specified and agreed to by EMPLOYER before delivery. The services will be presented by qualified instructors to designated employees of EMPLOYER at weekly or other intervals specified by EMPLOYER with no more than 30 employees per session. Training will be conducted at EMPLOYER's facility.

**Description of Services:** DISTRICT will provide training designed to develop and/or improve employee skills in one or more of the following categories: Continuous Improvement. Each training session will vary depending on EMPLOYER's needs.

# Terms of this agreement: March 3, 2016 – June 30, 2016

**Compensation:** The DISTRICT will prepare a separate Employer Training Agreement for each training session that the EMPLOYER conducts through the DISTRICT. The DISTRICT will invoice EMPLOYER at the end of the contracted training session. EMPLOYER agrees to provide entire payment within 30 calendar days upon receipt of invoice from DISTRICT.

This contract will outline Phase One and total \$50,000.00. (200 hours @ \$250.00 per hour). It is likely that to complete the entire scope of work outlined by the client, there will be a Phase II to the project.

The EMPLOYER agrees to pay the SOLANO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT Net 30 after each monthly invoice is submitted. SOLANO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT will work in good faith to coordinate Employer Training Panel (ETP) funding where applicable. However, SOLANO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT cannot guarantee that Mariani Packing Company will receive ETP funding.

**Intellectual Property:** Any curriculum developed or improved during the course of this agreement at the DISTRICT's expense, will become property of the DISTRICT. The DISTRICT shall retain for state and educational purposes limited intellectual property rights. This limited right is a royalty-free, non-exclusive, non-transferable, irrevocable license, for governmental and educational use of any knowledge, data, know-how, and materials conceived and practiced during the term of the AGREEMENT. In the process of customizing a curriculum for the EMPLOYER, the EMPLOYER must identify all copyrighted material, trade secrets, or other proprietary information that are exempt from disclosure under the Public Records Act (California Code, Sections 6250 et seq.). The EMPLOYER maintains all rights to previously copyrighted or patented material under its name or company.

**Hold Harmless:** The DISTRICT and EMPLOYER agree to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other party, its board officers, agents, and employees, individually and collectively, from and against all claims, liabilities,

obligations and cause of action of whatever kind arising in any manner whatsoever out of or in connection with this AGREEMENT for the acts or omissions of its officers, agents and employees.

**Confidentiality:** The confidentiality of student and employee records is protected by state and Federal laws. The DISTRICT will not access any information unless authorized to do so by individual or EMPLOYER. The DISTRICT will only access information necessary to register or enroll the student or employee into the appropriate class or program. The DISTRICT will maintain the confidentiality of information in compliance with DISTRICT policies and state and Federal laws. The DISTRICT will keep all data whether in electronic or printed format CONFIDENTIAL.

**Third-Party Information Sharing:** The DISTRICT and EMPLOYER and its employees understand that in the performance of this contract, all information which may be considered proprietary or confidential will not be discussed with a third party. Any press release on the program that does not include proprietary information must be approved by both parties.

**Cancellation:** This AGREEMENT may be amended or cancelled by mutual written consent of the parties. In the event of termination, EMPLOYER agrees to reimburse DISTRICT for actual costs incurred to date of cancellation.

Conflict of Interest: The EMPLOYER agrees not to enter into competitive agreement with DISTRICT instructors or consultants from the date of this agreement, until one year after the completion of this AGREEMENT. It is agreed that the instructors and consultants furnished by the DISTRICT are made possible only by a substantial investment in advertising, recruiting, testing and training of personnel. In consideration of the time and expense invested in these personnel, it is agreed that the EMPLOYER will not solicit for hire DISTRICT instructors or consultants while they are still associated with the DISTRICT, and for 1 year after termination of association with the DISTRICT. EMPLOYER agrees to pay a placement fee of \$5,000 for every DISTRICT instructor or consultant EMPLOYER hires.

**Debarment & Suspension:** In accordance with Executive Orders 12549 & 12689, Contractor certified by entering into this transaction, that neither it nor its principal(s) is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any federal department or state agency.

CONTRACTOR agrees to cooperate with DISTRICT in carrying out training and necessary administrative activities. CONTRACTOR designates Kelly Penwell, Associate Dean Workforce Development to assist DISTRICT in completing ETP required records, including but not limited to, managing the attendance roosters, documentation of training hours, and support certification of retention and employee/training wage information.

# The DISTRICT will pay CONTRACTOR per the following schedule:

Reimbursement rates are established by the Employment Training Panel (ETP) per contract.

- Job 1=\$13.47 per student contact hour for Large Priority Employers
- Job 2=\$19.45 per student contact hour for Small Priority Employers

Only courses listed in Exhibit A will be approved for compensation by the DISTRICT and all courses must be pre-approved by the DISTRICT prior to their offering. This contract is for up to \$75,000. The amount can be raised by a separate contract amendment.

CONTRACTOR must submit all required documents as per the contract prior to invoicing. Payment will be made to CONTRACTOR (30) days after receipt of invoice.

This agreement will be from April 19, 2016 to May 3, 2017. CONTRACTOR can only provide training up to February 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2017 to allow for the 90-day-retention period.

Either party may terminate this agreement with or without cause, upon sixty (60) days written notice to other party. In the event of termination CONTRACTOR will immediately cease work or services. CONTRACTOR will be entitled to compensation for all service rendered prior to notice of termination, and DISTRICT shall be entitled to reimbursement for any compensation paid in excess of services rendered.

CONTRACTOR agrees to follow all terms set forth by Employment Training Panel in Exhibit B (referenced to Exhibit C – Third party agreement in El Camino Community College District ET15-0427) Agreement with the ETP.

#### **CONTRACT SERVICES AGREEMENT**

THIS CONTRACT SERVICES AGREEMENT (herein "Agreement") is made and entered into this 19<sup>th</sup> day of April 2016, by and between El Camino Community College District (herein "DISTRICT") and **Solano Community College District**, (herein "CONTRACTOR").

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

#### 1.0 SERVICES

CONTRACTOR agrees to provide training to companies using Employment Training Panel (ETP) funds administered by the DISTRICT. Training will be held at company sites.

#### 2.0 ETP ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTING

The CONTRACTOR agrees to cooperate with the El Camino Community College District in carrying out training and necessary administrative activities. The CONTRACTOR designates (name/title) Kelly Penwell, Associate Dean Workforce Development assist DISTRICT in completing the ETP required records, including but not limited to, managing the attendance rosters, documentation of training hours, and support certification of retention and employee/training wage information.

#### 3.0 COMPENSATION

The DISTRICT will pay CONTRACTOR according to the following schedule:

Reimbursement rates are established by the Employment Training Panel (ETP) per contract.				
• Job 1 = \$13.47 per student contact hour for Large Priority Employers				
• Job 2 = \$19.45 per student contact hour for Small Priority Employers				

Only courses listed in Exhibit A will be approved for compensation by the District and all courses must be pre-approved by the DISTRICT prior to their offering. The contract amount for this agreement will be <u>up to</u> \$75,000.00 dollars. This contract cap amount may be increased through a separate contract amendment.

#### 4.0 PAYMENT

The CONTRACTOR must submit all required class roster sign-in sheets, utilizing approved forms, to DISTRICT prior to invoicing. CONTRACTOR will invoice the DISTRICT for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement. The DISTRICT shall issue payment to CONTRACTOR within thirty (30) days after receipt of invoice from CONTRACTOR.

#### **5.0 TERM**

The term of this AGREEMENT will be from April 19, 2016, through May 3, 2017.

To comply with the Employment Training Panel's (ETP) training term, <u>CONTRACTOR</u> can only provide training up to February 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2017, to allow for the 90-day-retention period.

Either party may terminate this Agreement any time, with or without cause, upon sixty (60) days written notice to the other party. Upon receipt of the notice of termination, CONTRACTOR shall immediately cease all work or services hereunder. In the event of termination, CONTRACTOR shall be entitled to compensation for all services rendered prior to the effectiveness of the notice of termination, and the DISTRICT shall be entitled to reimbursement for any compensation paid in excess of the service rendered.

#### 6.0 INDEMNIFICATION

The DISTRICT shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless CONTRACTOR, its officers, employees and agents from and against all losses and expenses (including costs of reasonable attorneys' fees) by reason of liability imposed by laws upon CONTRACTOR for damages because of bodily injury, personal injury, including death at any time resulting therefrom, sustained by any person or persons or on account of damage to property, including loss of use thereof, arising out of or in consequence of the performance of this Agreement, provided such injuries to persons or damage to property are not due to the negligent acts or omissions of CONTRACTOR, its officers, employees, agents or any other person or persons under the CONTRACTOR'S direct supervision and control; or of its subcontractors or anyone directly or indirectly employed by either of them.

CONTRACTOR shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the DISTRICT, its officers, employees and agents from and against all losses and expenses (including costs of reasonable attorneys' fees) by reason of liability imposed by laws upon the DISTRICT for damages because of bodily injury, personal injury, including death at any time resulting therefrom, sustained by any person or persons or on account of damage to property, including loss of use thereof, arising out of or in consequence of the performance of this Agreement, provided such injuries to persons or damage to property are not due to the negligent acts or omissions of the DISTRICT, its officers, employees, agents or any other person or persons under the DISTRICT'S direct supervision and control; or of its subcontractors or anyone directly or indirectly employed by either of them.

#### 7.0 ASSIGNMENT

The District shall not assign this Agreement or the consideration payable under this Agreement without the written consent of the Contractor.

# 8.0 WRITTEN NOTICE

All notices required or permitted to be given by this Agreement shall be deemed given when personally delivered to the recipient thereof or two (2) days after it has been mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, and addressed to the parties.

### 9.0 AMENDMENT/MODIFICATION

No amendment to this Agreement shall be effective unless it is approved in writing and signed by all parties in the same manner as this Agreement.

#### 10.0 ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement sets forth the entire Agreement between the parties, and supersedes all other oral or written provisions.

#### **Exhibit B: Subcontracts**

1. The Employment Training Panel (ETP) is not a party to this Agreement. ETP is not obligated in any manner for any liability that may arise out of this Agreement. No third party relationship is intended or created with ETP under this Agreement.

- Consultant agrees that ETP has the right, during normal business hours, to examine or audit any and all records, books, papers and documents related to the delivery of services, including all accounting source payroll documents, under this Agreement to the extent ETP deems necessary.
- Consultant agrees that ETP has the right, during normal business hours, to freely observe and monitor the delivery of services under this Agreement with or without the Consultant's presence. In particular, Consultant agrees that ETP has the right to interview trainees, trainers and training personnel.
- 4. Consultant agrees to maintain all records and other writings that pertain to the delivery of services under this Agreement for a period of no less than 4 years from termination or 3 years from Fiscal Closeout, whichever is later. This does not relieve Contractor of its responsibility under the ETP Agreement.
- 5. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. If ETP is named as a party in litigation, arbitration or other proceedings in connection with this Agreement, the exclusive venue and place of jurisdiction will be the County of Sacramento in the State of California.
- 6. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the terms of this Agreement and the ETP Agreement, the latter shall govern and prevail.
- 7. In no event shall the administrative fees paid under this Agreement with ETP funds exceed 13% of payment earned for Retraining. As used herein, "payment earned" means the amount of reimbursement the Contractor is entitled to retain based on ETP Fiscal Closeout. [Section 4400(r).]

Note: These provisions must be incorporated into any Agreement (subcontract) between Contractor and a consultant for administration of the ETP-funded training project. These provisions need not be used verbatim, but any variation must be approved by the ETP Legal Office. Contractor means the party that holds the contract and Consultant means the party that is responsible for administrative services.

# RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF A TRANSPORTATION FEE ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Associated Students of Solano Community College (ASSC) desires to assist with the implementation of an ongoing solution to current transportation issues facing students; and

Whereas, low-income students of Solano Community College are unable to afford transportation modes that meet their academic needs which impacts academic performance and, denies them access to an equitable education; and

Whereas, implementation of a two year student transportation fee would help subsidize public transportation access and be an important step toward creating a more accessible and equitable transportation system; and

Whereas, implementing a student transportation fee program would allow students to join the Solano Community College District in its mission to participate in green and sustainable programs and will help to reduce carbon emissions from motor vehicles; and

Whereas, such a program would guarantee more students a mode of transportation to campus throughout the year, sustaining and potentially increasing enrollment at SCC; and

Whereas, the municipal transportation agencies (City Coach/Vacaville; FAST/Fairfield; and Sol Trans/Vallejo) that support our students attend the main Solano Community College Fairfield campus as well as the centers located in Vallejo and Vacaville have agreed to participate in providing reduced fare costs to our students; and

Whereas, the Solano Transportation Authority has worked with ASSC student government, the Solano Community College District and each municipal carrier to determine the reduction in costs as well as ways to improve services; and

Whereas, California Education Code 76361(a) authorizes Districts to collect a fee for the purposes of "...reducing fares for services provided by common carriers or municipally owned transit systems to these students..."; and

Whereas, in accordance with California Education Code 76361(b)(2), a district's Governing Board may require all students to pay for a transportation fee, contingent upon a favorable vote of 50% of the majority plus one of the eligible ballots cast by the students and the fee and services will be provided to the students; and

Whereas, a California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office Legal Opinion published in December of 2009 states "If the transportation fee results from an election described above, students who take only online classes may be charged the fee, because assessment does not depend on actual use of the services"; and

Whereas the Transportation Fee to be collected pursuant to this vote shall not exceed the amount of \$10 per semester; a total of \$20 per year per full time student and in accordance with California Education Code 76361(c) a prorated fee based upon the number of unites taken per semester will be collected from part time students;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Associated Students of Solano Community College approves the imposition of a Student Transportation Fee at Solano Community College after a favorable vote in an election to be held in March of 2016

# **Design Standard for Lighting**

# **Purpose:**

This design standard has the purpose of specifying complete luminaires with a level of quality which meets the requirements throughout the Solano Community College District for all renovation and new building projects.

#### **Design Standards:**

- All lighting shall be designed per the latest edition of the California Electrical Code, California Energy Code, and California Green Energy standards.
- Comply with the recommendations of the Illuminating Engineering Society (IES).
- Comply with applicable ANSI standards pertaining to lamp materials, lamp ballasts, drivers, transformers, and luminaire.
- Comply with applicable NEMA standards pertaining to lighting equipment.
- Comply with fallout and retention requirements of CBC for diffusers, baffles, louvers, and the like.
- Provide all structural and seismic supports as required by the California Building Code and approved by DSA.
- All lighting fixtures, and their placement in the building, shall be selected with future maintenance in mind.
  - No fixture shall be selected or mounted that will require more than one person to service the fixture.
  - Nor shall they be located where a 6-10 foot ladder cannot readily access the fixture for relamping or other maintenance.
- Provide luminaires and lamp holders which comply with UL standards and have been UL listed and labeled for location and use indicated.
- Fixtures shall have a minimum 5-year warranty from the manufacturer.
- Provide spares as noted:
  - Furnish 2 percent extra lens or louvers for each size and type of luminaire.
  - Furnish 5 percent extra drivers for each size and type of fixture.
  - Furnish 10% extra lamps for each site and type installed.
- Light Emitting Diode (LED) technical requirements:
  - Luminaire manufactures shall have a minimum of five (5) years' experience in the manufacture and design of LED products. All LED sources shall be of proven quality from established and reputable LED manufacturers. Acceptable LED manufactures unless otherwise noted are:
    - Cree, Inc.
    - Philips Lighting
    - Osram Optronic Semiconductors.
    - Nichia
    - GE Lumination
  - LED luminaires and components shall be UL listed.
  - LEDs shall have a rated source life of 50,000 hours under normal operating conditions. LED "rated source life" is defined as the time when a minimum of 70% initial lumen output remains.
  - LED's shall be adequately protected from moisture or dust in interior applications.

- Luminaire assembly shall include a method of dissipating heat so as to not degrade life of source, electronic equipment, or lenses. LED luminaire housing shall be designed to transfer heat from the LED board to the outside environment. Thermal management shall be passive design. The use of fans or other mechanical equipment is not allowed.
- LED drivers shall have reverse polarity protection, open circuit protection and a minimum 80 percent efficiency. Class A noise rating.
- LED fixtures shall be capable of full and continuous dimming. There shall be no visible flicker to the unaided eye over the dimming range.
- Photometry shall comply with IESNA LM-79 "Electrical and photometric measurements of solid state lighting products"
- Luminaires shall be constructed such that LED modules may be replaced or repaired without the replacement of the whole fixture.
- The LED arrays shall be constructed such that a failure of an individual LED will not result in the loss of the entire array.

# Interior lighting shall be designed with the following considerations:

- Interior lighting shall be LED based. The use of non-LED fixtures is not allowed without the approval of the district on a case by case basis.
- Where lighting control systems are required per Title 24, the system shall include lighting relay control panels, daylight harvesting, motion sensors, switch inputs, and connections to other building systems (fire alarm, security and energy management systems for HVAC.)
- For classrooms supporting AV presentations:
  - Provide multi-level switching and/or dimming to switch front of class to support AV presentations while allowing some light in the student area for note taking.
  - Provide a lighting control location at front of class for easy control by instructor.
- Restroom lighting is recommended to be specified with lenses for ease of cleaning. Avoid installation of lighting over stalls (hard to maintain).
- Consider the high surface brightness of LEDs and specify downlights with diffusing lenses or recessed LED arrays within the fixtures to minimize glare.
- Under cabinet lighting shall be low profile and easily integrate into the furniture.
- Non-electric supplied exit signs shall be non-radioactive photoluminescent signs. Tritium powered (radioactive) exit signs are prohibited for installation on campus.
- Each luminaire shall consist of an assembly that utilizes LEDs as the light source. In addition, a complete luminaire shall consist of a housing, LED array, and electronic driver.
- Luminaire shall be high efficacy with a minimum of 60 lumens per watt.
- Where recessed luminaires are installed in cavities intended to be insulated, provide IC rated luminaire or other code approved installation.
- Recessed 2'x4' luminaires shall employ concealed LED's with a center panel.
- Luminaires installed under canopies, roof or open porches, and similar damp or wet locations, shall be UL listed for damp or wet locations.
- Recessed luminaires shall have the frame compatible with ceiling material installed at particular location. Provide proper factory trim and frame to fit location and ceiling material.

- Finishes:
  - Manufacturer's standard finish (unless otherwise indicated) over a corrosion resistant primer.
  - Interior Light Reflecting Finishes: White or specular finish with not less than 85 percent reflectance.
- Light Transmitting Components:
  - Plastic diffusers, molded or extruded of 100 percent virgin acrylic.
  - Prismatic acrylic, extruded, flat diffusers, 0.125 inch overall thickness, unless otherwise noted

### Exterior Lighting shall be designed with the following considerations:

- Confirm the color kelvin temperature rating with respect to security, proximity to observatories, and as directed by District. For example, the International Dark-Sky Association recommends a warmer 3000K rating or lower for minimizing light pollution and visual comfort. However, parking areas and higher security locations may consider a cooler 5000K rating or higher for increased visibility.
- There is a need to connect exterior fixtures to on site lighting circuits, some on night lighting circuits. Verify requirements for each of the campuses or as directed by the District.
- Provide accent lighting for building (i.e. entrances.) Entrance lighting is important as there are as many night school students as day.
- Provide for art and accent landscape lighting to surrounding area from any renovation, remodel or new construction including, but not limited to controls of lighting and point of connection.
- Coordinate placement of fixture with landscape plan to ensure trees and brush do not conflict with lights.
- Parking lots, major walkways, pathways, stairs, and intersections should be sufficiently lit to meet safety standards. Provide adequate lighting for safety without over lighting.
- Lights must have cut-offs to cover intended area but no more. Comply with Title 24 and consider minimizing light pollution.
- State of California minimum photometric foot candles for various areas must be met.
