Honestly, I didn't know what this program was about, so I had to check it out. As soon as I walked in the door, I realized it's a training laboratory at the cornerstone of so many high wage technology driven jobs. The Maker Space program will teach students how to use CNC machines, 2D and 3D CAD printers, vacuum formers, laser and vinyl cutters, as well as basic hand and power tools. Learning to use this equipment is essential to a diverse range of high demand career fields, such as advanced manufacturing. Congrats to SCC Drafting Instructor Karen Cook for pulling the program together. So proud workforce training programs are alive and doing well at SCC.



Board Meeting Features Biotech Program Update

The Board was presented with an update from the Biotechnology department during its May 2 meeting.

The presentation team talked about the new courses offered in the BS Biomanufacturing degree, the 2017 and 2018 cohorts, the requisites and the Biotech certificate SCC offers.

There are 14 students in the 2017 cohorts. They are all expected to graduate in 2019. There are 28 students accepted in the 2018 cohort.

The Board was told about where some of these students are currently working, including Genentech and Biomarin. They also learned about the collaborations SCC Biotech has with the local high schools.

Creative Writing Class End of Year Event



Creative writing students enrolled in Professor Michael Wyly's English 006, 007, and 010 performed a reading of ekphrastic poetry and prose, as part of the Ultra-Violet student art exhibition now on display in the Dorothy Herger Gallery (Building 1300). Ekphrasis (adj. ekphrastic) is the use of description of a visual work as a literary device. The reading marked the final chapter of a semester-long collaboration between Professor Marc Lancet's sculpture students and Wyly's creative writing students. During this collaboration, sculpture students exchanged objects with the creative writing students who in turn placed language on the objects. These objects and words were used to create the assemblage sculptures now on display as part of the Ultra Violet show. The creative writing students then composed their ekphrases as a response to the displayed assemblages.

Puente Program's End of Year Celebration





The evening featured several student speakers, a slideshow highlighting the year's events, and a taco bar. Mentors were recognized for the vital role they play in the program with their guidance and inspiration.

Puente Coordinators Rebecca LaCount (Counseling) and Isabel Anderson (English) are proud of the work these students have done and thank the Solano College community for their support!

The Puente Project is part of a statewide program sponsored by the University of California whose mission is to increase the number of educationally disadvantaged students who enroll in four-year colleges and universities, earn college degrees and return to the community as mentors and leaders to future generations. Students enroll in English and Counseling, and are assigned a community mentor, establishing a support system in their first semester at Solano. Co-curricular events include college and university visits, a conference hosted by the UC Office of the President, a family night, mentor-student activities, and student services workshops.
