Three Inspiring Women

As an IMANI student you have access to a wealth of information. Whenever our program receives valuable insights and opportunities from sources both on and off campus, we make sure to quickly pass this information along to our members.

This edition of the IMANI newsletter showcases three extraordinary women who have seized these opportunities to achieve their personal and professional aspirations. Among the opportunities that these individuals have pursued are the Solano Connex Community Fellowship and the Miss Vallejo/Tri-City Pageant.

The Solano Connex Community Fellowship is a program established by Solano County and Touro University California to improve access to mental and emotional health services for residents and providers. Participants receive training in identifying, intervening, and referring community members they encounter who are experiencing mental health challenges. Upon completing the program, the volunteer will receive a Mental Health First Aid certificate. The fellowship also provides a \$1000 stipend and the opportunity to create an action plan for Solano County communities.

The Miss Vallejo/Tri-City Pageant is the first local competition for the Fairfield, American Canyon, Benicia, and Vallejo regions, serving as a gateway to the Miss California and Miss America pageants. The program encourages community advocacy, sisterhood, empowerment, and academic achievement, while offering scholarships and mentorship to participants. The winner of the competition receives a \$1500 scholarship.

In this article you will meet Kamilah Cable, Charetta Kaye Chase, and Rhoni Wilborn, three inspiring IMANI sisters who exemplify the spirit of excellence. These three amazing women lead dynamic lives and embrace challenges with open arms.

Kamilah Cable

Kamilah Cable is a highly accomplished individual who has fulfilled many of her dreams and is constantly striving to fulfill more. One of her passions is empowering women through media, business endeavors, and volunteer work. Kamilah never misses an opportunity to assist women and promptly responded to the call to support her local community members who are struggling with mental health.

Kamilah is a first-semester student at Solano Community College (SCC). Her major is Sociology with plans to minor in Communications. She plans to graduate in Fall 2025 and transfer to UC Berkeley to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Sociology. After graduation she plans to become an academic counselor.

Kamilah became aware of the Solano Connex Community Fellowship via an email from the IMANI Sisterhood Program. She attended the two-hour Mental Health Awareness Training, provided by Touro University, applied for the fellowship and was accepted immediately.

The motivation to apply for the fellowship is her involvement in her community. As the women's leader at the Lighthouse Covenant Fellowship Church, she finds joy in helping other women. She identifies with the unique challenges that come with being a woman such as balancing motherhood, a career, and entrepreneurship.

Reading about the fellowship intrigued her to want to learn more. Kamilah shared that she wanted to know how, "I could point out the signs and a place where I can direct women to go, because it was something I didn't know about when I was having my kids. So, I spent a lot of my twenties in postpartum depression and I kind of had to get myself out of it because I didn't know of any resources."

Participating in the fellowship program provides Kamilah the opportunity to offer solutions to a problem. She describes herself as a solution-based person, "so if I can be part of a solution, I'm definitely interested."

One aspect of the program Kamilah found noteworthy is the SolanoConnex app that can be accessed via their web browser. The app connects you to all the mental health services in your area when you enter your Solano County zip code. To access the app, click here.

Kamilah's advice to other students applying for opportunities, "It's scary when you hear apply...it makes you nervous. But, you miss out on opportunities that you don't apply for...so even if you think you'll never get it, just apply."

Kamilah's mission is to prioritize women's mental health, stating that "women have a lot going on in their lives and can often feel lost." She remembers the COVID-19 pandemic as a challenging time for women who had to juggle multiple responsibilities, such as homeschooling their children while running businesses or working from home. "It was a very stressful time, and we are still in the process of healing," she said.

Kamilah is a hairstylist who specializes in sister-locks. For Kamilah, sister-locks symbolizes both longevity and uniqueness. Being a stylist allows her to interact with women and listen to their stories during the three-hours they sit in her salon chair. Both Kamilah and her clients find the exchange of sharing information and advice therapeutic. Being a stylist was the start of her journey of empowering women.

Kamilah leverages media to support women, and her published book, "The Voice: Shy's Story," speaks to this. The fictional short story follows a young woman who "had her life put together for her," according to the author. The book touches on mental health struggles, the significance of parent-child relationships, and the importance of listening to your inner voice. Additionally, it highlights the subtleties of physical abuse.

Kamilah's podcast, The Invisible Woman, can be streamed on Spotify. It's a personal journal that delves into her internal struggles with womanhood. For a long time, Kamilah felt like she came second in society, leading her to resent being a woman. She believed that there was nothing special about her gender beyond society's preconceived notions. Through her podcast, Kamilah aims to shed light on the invisible struggles that women face in the hopes of creating a space where women feel comfortable being visible, speaking up for themselves, expressing their likes and dislikes, and choosing to be unconventional.

Kamilah revealed that she recently took part in the Fall 2023 Speech competition at SCC and came out on top, clinching the 1st place spot. Her speech revolved around the anxiety of being a stay-at-home mom. When asked how she chose this topic, she responded, "It's the topic of my life." Winning the contest has presented a new opportunity for her, as she is now a proud member of the Speech and Debate Team.

preparing to shift gears and pursue a career in the medical industry. In pursuit of her career goals, she's constantly on the lookout for opportunities to grow and develop. Recently, she stepped up to assist community members in Solano County who are facing mental health issues.

Charetta Kaye Chase

Charetta embarked on her SCC college journey in the summer of 2023. Her major is Registered Nursing and she is considering a

Charetta Kaye Chase is a true professional, dedicated to serving others. She currently works as a realtor in Solano County, with over two decades of experience in the field. However, she's now

minor in Political Science. By the spring of 2025, she plans to fulfill the general education and the prerequisites required to gain entry into the Nursing Program. Charetta's objective is to earn both an Associate of Science and a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing. Additionally, she has already acquired her Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) license. With her CNA background, Charetta believes that the Registered Nursing program will be more manageable for her. "As a CNA in the emergency room and in ICU...a lot of it will come easier to me than someone that doesn't have that experience," Charetta expressed.

Charetta discovered the Solano Connex Community Fellowship through the IMANI Sisterhood Program and, after reviewing the guidelines, felt confident that she would be accepted since she met both criteria of working or volunteering in Solano County. True enough, she received an acceptance call from a program representative within two minutes of submitting her application. "I was immediately accepted," Charetta shared.

Charetta is the Woman's Auxiliary President for the American Legion's Post 178 in Rio Vista, where she volunteers her time. She has a personal connection to the organization, as her husband, a disabled veteran and active member, "suffers from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) due to his military service" shared Charetta. She understands the impact of military life on service members and their families. "I support the veterans, I just believe in what they do...when one person in the family serves everyone in the family serves," said Charetta. She is a proud mother of two adult children.

Receiving a Mental Health First Aid certificate was the inspiration for Charetta to apply for the fellowship. This certification will not only enhance her career prospects in the medical field but also pave the way for her to work in Mental Health facilities.

Being a part of the fellowship program is a significant opportunity for Charetta since her contributions will be included in the report submitted to the county. The volunteers' input will play a role in the action plan formulated by the county.

When asked for advice about applying for scholarships, internships, and jobs, Charetta offered a helpful tip: "Apply to anything that interests you...even if you don't think you're qualified or have a chance of getting it...just go for it."

Charetta expressed her appreciation of the IMANI Sisterhood Program, stating "I think it's wonderful."

Rhoni Wilborn

Rhoni Wilborn is a student who is determined to overcome her shyness and she's doing it in the most public way. She is competing in the local Miss Vallejo-Tri City Pageant.

Rhoni's academic career commenced in Spring 2022 at SCC where she chose American Sign Language (ASL) as her major. Her anticipated graduation date is Spring 2024. Rhoni's ultimate goal is to pursue a Bachelor's degree at California State University Northridge, and eventually work as an ASL interpreter.

When Rhoni enrolled at SCC she set a goal to obtain her Associate degree within two years. She was determined to stick to this deadline, but soon realized that it was too rigid. "I learned that it was okay to take longer than two years to complete my studies," she explained. Rhoni still had high expectations for herself, but allowed herself more flexibility. She acknowledged that everyone works at their own pace and it's important to be kind to oneself in the process of achieving your goals.

It was the email from the IMANI Sisterhood program that piqued Rhoni's interest in the Miss Vallejo Tri-City pageant. But her inspiration to compete was solely for the purpose of personal growth. She describes herself as shy and never envisioned participating in a public competition. She shared, "I just wanted to get out of my comfort zone."

Being part of the contest allowed Rhoni to meet and bond with the other contestants. "Sisterhood is one of the five pillars of the Miss America organization", said Rhoni. The organization believes, just as the IMANI Sisterhood Program believes, that supporting each other and building lifelong relationships are important aspects of life. In addition to sisterhood, Rhoni identified the other pillars as success, service, scholarship, and style.

Preparing for the competition requires the contestants to learn and practice a choreographed routine, and to train and practice for the fitness, evening gown, public speaking and talent segments of the competition. Rhoni's talent was performing Ed Sheeran's song, Thinking Out Loud in American Sign Language (ASL).

Rhoni has a deep passion for ASL and the art of interpreting. This passion was further ignited during her time as a student at Pinole Valley High School, where she took classes with ASL teacher Ms. Lamons-Raiford, who is also a professor at SCC. Rhoni expressed that Professor Lamons-Raiford "is the reason I came to the Fairfield campus," reflecting the profound impact her teacher had on her.

Rhoni wants to educate others about ASL and offered the following: "I would like to encourage everyone reading this article to just learn about the Deaf and Hard of Hearing community and to get involved. Even the smallest gesture is fine...knowing the basics of how to communicate...having a conversation and not being afraid to introduce yourself is great. Just knowing the basics of how to communicate with this community will warm their hearts. They are a very friendly and welcoming community."

Rhoni has proudly achieved various feats, including founding and serving as the President of the Pinole Valley High School Cosmetology Club and serving on the City of Pinole Youth Commission.

On November 18th, the Miss Vallejo Tri City competition was held at the Empress Theatre in Vallejo. The contestants had the support of their family and friends, who were present in large numbers. The winners were announced at the end of the event, with Rhoni taking home the Miss Congeniality and Advertisement Sales awards.



For students seeking scholarships, internships, or other opportunities, Rhoni has some valuable advice: "Be confident in who you are. If you have a thought to apply, do it! You are the only person who can hold you back...you won't see those open doors unless you create them for yourself. Get out of your comfort zone and everything that is for you will come to you."

Rhoni, in addition to your achievements with the Miss Vallejo-Tri City pageant, you are also the MVP of persistence!



Academic Success and Tutoring Center

The Academic Success and Tutoring Center (ASTC) provides tutoring to SCC students in several academic subjects.

For in-person tutoring, there is no need to make an appointment. The tutoring center operates on a drop-in basis, so students can just drop by in person to connect with tutors. Students just need to make sure to have their Solano Student ID number ready so they can sign in. ASTC's FREE services include: drop-in tutoring; a supportive and comfortable place to study/do homework; computers and printers; anatomy models; white board use; study rooms; and information on other campus resources.
