# Solano Community College GE

## Solano Community College General Education (Local/Non-Transfer)

In using this option for the General Education requirement students must complete:

1. A minimum of 21 units with at least 3 units from each Area A, B1, C, D1, D2, and E.
2. The Local District Requirement of Health and Kinesiology.

Note:

- If two courses are selected from the same Area to fulfill the 21 unit requirement, they must have a different course prefix. Exceptions: ENGL and MATH.
- Courses with the same prefix as the student's major may not be used to fulfill general education requirements. Exceptions: ENGL 001 (Area D1) and MATH (Area D2).

# Intersegmental General Education Curriculum

IGETC is a series of courses that allows community college transfer students to fulfill lower-division general education requirements either at the UC or the CSU system. The IGETC pattern is most useful for students who want to keep their options open before making a final decision about transferring to a particular UC or CSU campus. Completion of IGETC does not guarantee admission, nor is it generally required for admission. IGETC is not appropriate for some majors. # Course Identification Numbering System (C-ID)

The Course Identification Numbering System (C-ID) is a statewide numbering system that is different from the course numbers assigned by individual California Community Colleges. A C-ID Designator next to a course means that the course is comparable in content and scope to a course offered by participating California colleges and universities. Thus, if the Solano Community College courses are listed below with a C-ID Designator, students can be assured that the courses will be accepted at a California college or university that offers the courses with the same C-ID Designator.

The C-ID Numbering System is particularly useful for students attending more than one California Community College since C-ID Designators are often applied to courses students need to prepare for transfer.

# Business

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## Associate in Science in Business Administration 2.0 for Transfer (ADT: A.S.-T)

This degree is a **NEW** version of the Associate in Science in Business Administration. Both versions are active and students may pursue either version of the degree and should consult a counselor to decide the best path to individual transfer institutions.

### Program Description

This curriculum is designed for students planning to transfer to the California State University system. Solano College's business courses provide a foundation of knowledge in key business areas such as business administration, law, accounting, marketing, finance, and economics, in addition to core courses in science and liberal arts.

Students who earn the Associate in Science in Business Administration 2.0 for Transfer will receive guaranteed priority admission to the CSU system, but not to a particular campus or major. Once admitted the student will only be required to complete 60 additional upper-division units to qualify for a BA degree.

### To earn the Associate in Science in Business Administration 2.0 for Transfer, students must:

1. Complete 60 semester units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following:
  - a. The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education – Breadth Requirements
  - b. A minimum of 18 semester units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district.
2. Obtain a minimum grade point average of 2.0.

### Program Outcomes

Students who complete the Associate in Science in Business Administration 2.0 for Transfer will be able to:

1. Recognize and describe the importance of marketing, law, economics, accounting, business administration, finance, risk analysis, and personnel management in business and formulate hypotheses based on these concepts.
2. Analyze practical business problems and utilize research and critical thinking to evaluate and recommend alternative solutions.
3. Use appropriate computer software to create and or modify relevant business documents.

Successful students who maintained at least a **70%** score on each unit and subject covered in this course may become eligible for certification by the State Fire Marshal as a Firefighter I. Additional fees are associated with this course. Fees may include and are not limited to purchase of uniforms, physical fitness attire, State Fire Marshal certificates, and other related costs.

# HORT - Horticulture

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## HORT 006

4.0 Units

### Identification and Ecology of Landscape Plant Materials

*Transferable to UC/CSU*

*Hours: 48-54 lecture, 48-54 lab*

A study of the identification, growth habits, cultural and environmental needs, ecology, and ornamental uses of common landscape and indoor plants adapted to California climates. Plants emphasized will come from the current California Association of Nurseries and Garden Centers (CANCG) and Professional Landcare Network (PLANET) certification test plants lists. Plant materials from local regions will also be included. Laboratory required.

## HORT 050 Introduction to Horticulture

3.0 Units

*General Education: SCC: Area A*

*Transferable to CSU*

*Hours: 32-36 lecture, 48-54 lab*

Introduction to plant science as it relates to horticulture. Topics introduced include plant ecology, botany and taxonomy, plant structure, growth processes, physiology, propagation, growth media and soils, biological competitors, pests, post-harvest factors of food, fiber and ornamental plants, and industry career opportunities. The principles and practices of horticultural crop and plant production as they relate to plant, soil and climatic relationships will be stressed.

## HORT 055 Soils and Fertilizers

3.0 Units

*Course Advisory: HORT 050*

*Transferable to CSU*

*Hours: 32-36 lecture, 48-54 lab*

A study of the soil's physical, chemical and biological properties. Soil classification, derivation, uses, function and management including erosion, moisture retention, structure, cultivation, organic matter and microbiology will be discussed. Laboratories focus on evaluating soil health and fertility with field measurements. Laboratory required.

## HORT 101 Plant Propagation and Production

3.0 Units

*Course Advisory: HORT 050*

*Hours: 32-36 lecture, 48-54 lab*

Plant propagation and production practices with emphasis on nursery and greenhouse operations, including sexual and asexual reproduction, planting, transplanting, fertilizing, plant pest and disease control; structures and site layout; preparation and use of propagating and planting mediums; use and maintenance of common tools and equipment; regulations pertaining to plant production. Laboratory required.



# HSW - Human Services and Social Work

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## **HSW 001 Introduction to Human Services 3.0 Units**

*General Education: CSU: Area D*

*Transferable to UC/CSU*

*Hours: 48-54 lecture*

Explore the history and purpose of human services and social work while familiarizing skills needed to provide culturally responsive services to diverse populations in areas such as social welfare, mental health, substance use, rehabilitation, and child, adult and elder care. Political and economic aspects inclusive of roles and functions of local human services and social work agencies systems will be examined.

## **HSW 082 Serving Diverse Populations 3.0 Units**

*Transferable to CSU*

*Hours: 48-54 lecture*

Explore the values, strengths, challenges, concerns and needs of diverse populations including, but not limited to, age, gender, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, physical or psychiatric (dis)ability, sexual orientation, and chemical dependency characteristics. Students have the opportunity to gain insight, knowledge and skills necessary to provide culturally responsive services when working with diverse populations in human services and social work settings.

## **HSW 083 Introduction To Case Management 3.0 Units**

*Prerequisite\*\*:* HSW 001

*Transferable to CSU*

*Hours: 48-54 lecture*

This introductory course will acquaint students with the traditional basic concepts and skills of case management. Students will learn the history and purpose of case management and legal and ethical considerations to consider when providing case management services. Ample opportunities are provided to practice assessment, service planning, completing referrals, monitoring services, and closing a case. Careers in case management and other related topics are explored.

## **HSW 085 Introduction to Group Processes 3.0 Units**

*Prerequisite\*\*:* HSW 001

*Transferable to CSU*

*Hours: 48-54 lecture*

An introduction to the theory and dynamics of group interaction including psychoeducational, support and therapeutic context. The various stages and processes of group development and facilitation are studied using both a conceptual and experiential approach. This course is intended to assist persons who will function as leaders in a variety of small group situations.

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## **KINE 003B**

### **Self-Defense - Intermediate**

*Course Advisory: KINE 003A*

*General Education: SCC: Local District Requirement, \*A*

*Transferable to UC*

*Hours: 48-54 lab*

This training course will continue to review and hone skills and introduce additional punches and kicks, punch defenses with counterattacks, defenses against various chokes and kicks, bearhugs, and headlocks. Precision elements such as timing, distance, and alternative targeting are introduced.

### **Pilates for Fitness - Intermediate**

*Course Advisory: KINE 006C*

*General Education: SCC: Local District Requirement, \*A*

*Transferable to UC*

*Hours: 48-54 lab*

This intermediate level class is designed for individuals with previous Pilates experience. Students will improve overall movement fluidity, breathing techniques, kinesthetic awareness, proprioception, core strength and endurance while integrating the mind/body connection during movement based on the original techniques developed by Joseph H. Pilates.

### **Cardio Conditioning - Intermediate**

*Course Advisory: KINE 005E*

*General Education: SCC: Local District Requirement, \*A*

*Transferable to UC*

*Hours: 48-54 lab*

Intermediate cardio conditioning course for students wanting increased intensity of cardio workouts. Students may use indoor cardio equipment including treadmills, stationary bikes, elliptical machines, and stair masters. Additionally, jogging/running, bicycling, and street elliptical machines may be used. Students will learn the important factor of pace, heart rate training, and cardio fitness. Students will design their own cardiovascular workout (in consultation with instructor) to achieve their personal fitness goals.

### **Circuit Training - Intermediate**

*General Education: SCC: Local District Requirement, \*A*

*Transferable to UC*

*Hours: 48-54 lab*

An intermediate exercise circuit course where students participate in a balanced strength and conditioning training program that provides upper body, lower body, and core exercises using free weights, machine weights, resistance bands, and individual's body weight.

## **KINE 013A**

### **Resistance Band Training- Intermediate**

*General Education: SCC: Local District Requirement, \*A*

*Transferable to UC*

*Hours: 48-54 lab*

An activity fitness course that utilizes resistance band techniques that can increase strength, flexibility, endurance and lean body composition. Resistance band exercises can help to improve and develop functionality and agility through strengthening weak muscles as well as core muscles. Students will learn to safely and effectively execute flexibility exercises and balancing exercises as well as strengthening exercises for all the major muscle groups. Skill exams and written exams serve to evaluate student achievement. Students will learn to design their own exercise programs to achieve their personal fitness goals.

### **Functional & Core Training - Intermediate**

*General Education: SCC: Local District Requirement, \*A*

*Transferable to UC*

*Hours: 48-54 lab*

Intermediate fitness course focusing on functional and core conditioning for students in physically demanding sports, fitness activities and professions. This course will help improve performance by utilizing the components of endurance, power, agility, strength, speed, stamina, flexibility, coordination, and balance.
