Melissa Reeve	English Faculty. Suggests maximal flexibility for students in completing local GE. With the increase of specific requirements by the state (adding 6 units), we should be careful to give students choices of how to satisfy units the requirements and ensure that we don't create a local GE where every single unit is accounted for for the student. Students are unique and can find their own ways to fulfill personal health and satisfaction benefits.
Andrew Wesley	Historian, Music Faculty. Spoke in support of keeping the multicultural component in our local degree. Removing it would be a disservice in the face of our institutional push for DEIA which is not just focusing on underrepresented people, but it is trying to make all of us equal and equitable. Does not feel that students will choose another college if our local degree has slightly higher unit requirements.

Discussion: We had 7 of 12 members of the Curriculum Committee present. In order to pass an item, we would need the 7 members to vote unanimously. With two other members (expected to arrive shortly) we would need 2/3 vote to pass an item.

Changes to DE area have not been completed by Jeanne Lorenz. Motion:Erin Duane moved to table this item. Doug Green. Seconded. Yeses: 7, Motion carried.

Item 8.1.B:

Revisited once Alison Bolton and James Word arrived after 2pm.

Based on new Title 5 requirements, we must now include 6 additional units and consider whether it is valuable to our students to keep our current local mandates in cross-cultural studies and life-long learning and self-development. GE Updates Unit Breakdowns handout was provided by Ashlie Lawson. Lisa Abbott shared a chart showing degrees and the number of electives left once life-long learning and cross-cultural units are taken into account. Discussion referenced public comments, the desire to give students choices, and an option to allow double counting of cross-cultural courses in either Arts and Humanities or Social and Behavioral Sciences. Ashlie Lawson explained that once we agree to the structure of local GE, we can look at the proposed courses to be included. Our new local GE has be done by Fall so it can be in the 2025 catalog.

Motion: Jose Cortes moved to accept Option 3: Include both Cross Cultural and "Lifelong Learning" and allow double count of cross-cultural courses in another area. Erin Duane seconded the motion. Discussion: there was no additional discussion Yeses: 8, Noes: 1, Abstentions: 0, Motion carried.

9. American Sign Language

Rationale for proposals a:

The reason for the change the prerequisite from ASL 0003 to ASL 053 is because this course ASL 054 is aligned with ASL 057. ASL 053, Introduction to Interpreting, is an introductory course that discusses the field of sign language interpreting as well as the various techniques and skills needed to interpret from English to ASL and from ASL to English. ASL 054 and 057 are both courses where those skills and techniques are applied. Students not only observe real working interpreters but also attempt to interpret basic-level material themselves. The skills that are studied and acquired in ASL 053 are then put into practice in ASL 054 and 057.

**Under the Bagley-Keene Act, a body does not have to listen to comments on matters that are not on the agenda or that were already considered in a public meeting where there was an opportunity to comment. Cal. Gov't Code § 11125.7(a).

Under the Brown Act, the public is entitled to comment on any matter within the subject matter jurisdiction of the legislative body, as well as any agenda item. Cal. Gov't Code § 54954.3(a). See Galbiso v. Orosi Pub. Util. Dist., 167 Cal. App. 4th 1063, 1080, 84 Cal. Rptr. 3d 788 (2008). Under the Brown Act, the legislative body does not have to listen to comments on items that are not within its subject matter jurisdiction. 78 Ops. Cal. Att'y Gen. 224 (1995). And, as under the Bagley-Keene Act, a legislative body under the Brown Act does not have to listen to comments on items that were already considered in a public meeting where there was an opportunity to comment. Cal. Gov't Code § 54954.3(a).

An agency may limit public comment on items described in the agenda to the time when those items are being considered. Olson v. Hornbrook Cmty. Servs. Dist., 33 Cal. App. 5th 502, 528, 245 Cal. Rptr. 3d 236 (March 26, 2019).

In addition, under both Acts, the body may adopt reasonable regulations to ensure that the above provisions are carried out, including but not limited to regulations limiting the total amount of time allocated to each individual speaker for public testimony or comment on particular issues. Cal. Gov't Code §§ 11125.7(b) (Bagley-Keene Act); 54954.3(b) (Brown Act). A legislative body of a local agency may regulate the time, place and manner for speech to ensure orderly discussion. Baca v. Moreno Valley Unified Sch. Dist., 936 F. Supp. 719 (C.D. Cal. 1996) (Brown Act); see, e.g., Ribakoff v. City of Long Beach, 27 Cal. App. 5th 150, 177, 238 Cal. Rptr. 3d 81 (2018) (rejecting plaintiff's First Amendment facial and as applied challenge to board's rule limiting public comment to three minutes); Olson, 33 Cal. App. 5th at 528 (holding limitation on public comment on agenda items to when those items are being considered was not an unreasonable regulation).
