Pearson-Bloom prides herself in stressing academic success and one look at the number of athletes who have earned academic honors shows what's most important to her and her staff.

Since 2000, softball student-athletes have been named to the Dean's List, earned the Bay Valley Conference's academic award, the President's Award, academic scholarship winners and been honored as Academic All-Americans.

Solano softball players have been recognized numerous times as an Academic All-American.

Solano's softball program has been honored multiple times for its team GPA by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association. "Ultimately, successfully completing their coursework here is the athlete's responsibility," said Terri. "The more transferable units a student-athlete earned, the higher the level they are eligible to play. Four-year college want players who will be eligible and stay eligible – that's why they recruit Solano athletes. GPA + units + softball ability = athletic scholarship."

Solano plays a tough preseason schedule that includes playing in competitive tournaments up and down Northern California as well as playing some of the state's topranked teams and going up against future Division I pitchers and hitters.

Head coach has plenty to offer area softball players

Terri Pearson-Bloom recently completed her ninth season at Solano having won more than 200 games, captured five conference titles and helped her team receive numerous national academic honors.

Pearson-Bloom brings a wealth of knowledge about the game of softball and has turned the Solano program into one of the most respected in Northern California.

Pearson-Bloom led the Falcons to a four-peat in 2009, capturing another Bay Valley Conference championship following those won in 2001, 2006, 2007 and 2008. The Falcons went 25-12 and 15-1 in conference and Pearson-Bloom was named Coach of the Year.

Before coming to Solano, Pearson-Bloom served

as the head coach for one year with the Virginia Roadsters of the Women's Professional Softball League during the 1999-2000 season where her team finished second place in the regular season. Pearson-Bloom was selected to coach in the All-Star Game.

Pearson-Bloom's coaching career began at St. Mary's College in Moraga where she served as an assistant from 1995-96. She moved on to the University of Tennessee and was an assistant for the Lady Vols for three seasons (1997-99).

She was a standout player at Cal State Northridge where she led the team to four regional appearances and three World Series appearances while batting leadoff and playing in the outfield.

In her final season at Northridge, the team advanced to the national championship game where it eventually lost to Arizona.

Pearson-Bloom's list of former players include Nebraska coach Jennifer Kline; Northridge coach, and USA Softball assistant coach, Barbara Jordan; Stanford assistant Trisha Dean and UNLV assistant Sara Pickering. While at Solano, Pearson-Bloom hopes to help her players achieve their potential on the field and in the classroom. The Solano staff emphasizes fundamentals and teaches the mechanics, skills and strategies to help them succeed both as a player and a coach.

She earned her bachelor's degree in Speech Communication from Northridge and her masters in Physical Education from Western Illinois. While at Tennessee, she began working on another masters in Sports Psychology. Pearson-Bloom and her husband, Andy, live in Dixon with their three children, Samantha, 7, Cailin, 5 and Nathan, 2.

Thanks to the passing of Measure G in 2002, renovations began in 2008 on the Solano softball facilities. Over half a million dollar improvements include new infield surfaces, new bleachers for fans and new dugouts for the home and away teams. SCC's pitching staff warms up in renovated clay bullpens while hitters will get lots of batting practice hitting in renovated, turfed batting cages. Other improvements include a new backstop, new turfed tee/toss hitting and new training area.

There are existing locker room facilities as well as a press box and scoreboard. The Falcons play on an all-natural playing surface which is one of the nicest in the state.

For fans arriving at the game, there is plenty of convenient parking and a cement path leading to the stadium where new high-rise bleachers await. Members of the media can also sit in the renovated press box located directly behind home plate.
